



Law, Security and Public Service

Visible policing, faster justice, firm public order and clean administration.

A strong state begins with safe streets, reliable courts and public institutions that serve citizens rather than themselves. The CNU will strengthen lawful enforcement while preserving evidence, defence rights and judicial review.

Police and public safety

- **Visible policing:** Police numbers, local patrols and rapid-response capacity increase, with national standards for response times and investigations.
- **Neighbourhood responsibility:** Local commanders publish crime priorities and hold regular public meetings on safety and enforcement.
- **Victim service:** Victims receive clear case updates, practical support and timely notice of major charging or sentencing decisions.
- **Professional standards:** Misconduct is investigated firmly, while officers acting lawfully receive institutional and legal support.

Courts and criminal justice

- **Faster courts:** More judges, digital case files and simplified procedure reduce delays without weakening the right to a defence.
- **Serious and repeat crime:** Sentencing places greater weight on public protection, repeat offending and deliberate violence.
- **Evidence and warrants:** Searches, surveillance and asset seizure require lawful authority and judicial oversight.
- **Prison purpose:** Prisons protect the public, enforce sentences and require work, education or rehabilitation from prisoners who are able to participate.

Organised crime and public order

- **Specialist enforcement:** Dedicated teams target trafficking, corruption, money laundering, violent extremism and criminal front businesses.
- **Public protest:** Peaceful protest remains lawful; rioting, intimidation, organised violence and attacks on worship sites receive firm penalties.
- **Criminal assets:** Property proven to be the proceeds of serious crime may be confiscated through a court order.
- **National coordination:** Police, border officers, financial investigators and prosecutors share intelligence under clear legal safeguards.

Clean and capable public service

- **Merit recruitment:** Public appointments and promotion are based on competence, conduct and performance.
- **Smaller administration:** Administrative headcount falls by 15% over five years mainly through attrition, automation and the merger of duplicated agencies.
- **Digital government:** Routine licences, taxes, permits and benefit applications move to secure digital services with an offline route for those who need it.
- **Open procurement:** Major contracts use competitive tendering, published performance data and personal accountability for repeated failure or fraud.

First-term commitments

- **Commitment:** Set national police response and investigation standards.
- **Commitment:** Fund additional judges and complete the transition to digital case files.
- **Commitment:** Create specialist organised-crime and public-corruption teams.
- **Commitment:** Begin the five-year public-administration reduction and service digitisation plan.
